Part 7 – Roles, Responsibilities and Decision-Making

Failure to clarify the husband/wife roles in a marriage relationship can cause major disruption.

Each couple should discuss together and decide who is most competent to do which task.

Assignment of tasks should **not** be made simply because of parental example, or what is expected by your social group, or because it is tradition.

Each course should establish their own style of working together.

It is imperative that a couple deliberately and mutually develop rules and guidelines for their personal relationship as husband and wife.

Such clear assignment of authority and responsibility by the partners working it out together does **not** create a rigid relationship but allows flexibility and order in what could become a chaotic mess.

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1 Corinthians 12:14-26 [NIV] *“Now the body is not made up of one part but of many. If the foot should say, “Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,” it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. And if the ear should say, “Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,” it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, “I don’t need you!” And the head cannot say to the feet, “I don’t need you!” On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and the parts that we think are less honourable we treat with special honour. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honour to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it.”*

After reading the above scripture consider the following thoughts about the roles of the husband and wife in decision-making.

1. The principle of mutual submissiveness in marriage is similar to the pattern of submissiveness between the members of the Body of Christ, the Church.
2. There are times in the church when it is appropriate for one member to exercise leadership over the other members as a function of their spiritual gifts.
3. No single spiritual gift automatically qualifies a member to be the leader or ultimate decision-maker all of the time. This position belongs to The Head, Jesus Christ himself.

The success of a Christian marriage lies in the negotiation and assignment of these leadership roles on the basis of the abilities of the partners.

In the marriage the husband has the office of head to take the lead in mutually examining the marriage to see if it is maturing according to its long-range goals.

Both the husband and wife remain free to be themselves and mature as a unique person reflecting their Creator God.

Clearly headship has nothing to do with being “boss”, the husband can only command the wife to live up to what the two of them mutually pledged when they were married.

If the husband neglects this office, the wife should remind her husband of their mutual vows.

Headship is a special office of service so that the marriage relationship may thrive and mature.
